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It is hard to believe how many things have changed beyond our imaginations since the wonderful Clan Gathering James Brisbin and Hugh Kincaid organised for us to enjoy at the Grandfather Mountain Highland Games two years ago. Not forever we trust, but for now it is masks, quarantines, anti-bac gel everywhere we go, no graduations or rites of passage for our young people again this year (over here in Britain at least) it could all look quite depressing. Indeed some of it is quite depressing! Anxiety lurks ready to swell the numbers of her ranks and then.... without the noise and hyperbole of coronavirus reporting the garden beckons where the birds are nesting and singing and the flowers beginning to display their exquisitely scented blooms. The sun thankfully comes up every morning and my desk awaits with projects to work on including a modest re-wilding scheme we are at the beginning of here at home. Thankfully Covid 19 has not quite stopped the world turning but the twin themes to which we always return of faith and family become more important than ever as other things are stripped away for the time being. For many elderly, in Britain at least, even a hug from a family member cannot be taken for granted.

As ever as we do not have to look back too far in history to remind ourselves that disease, hardship and battles have always afflicted humanity from the least to the greatest throughout history. In *A History of the Scottish People 1560-1830* which I was reading this morning It is evident that back in the 1400's in Scotland there was much political manoeuvring for power during the long years of one minority monarch after another acceding to the throne.

"James 1^{st,} after he emerged from captivity in 1424, was a strong and reforming monarch who did his best to restore the faded prestige of kingship: his reign ended on an assassin's dagger in 1437 and for nearly two hundred years after that every Scottish monarch came to the throne as a child. James II succeeded at the age of six years, James III at eight years, James IV at fifteen years and James V at one year, Mary Queen of Scots at only one week and James VI at one year."

Where there was a child monarch, ambitious nobles were never far away. The Scots people must have longed for a strong and capable adult monarch to lead them. A situation hard to imagine these days with Queen Elizabeth II still on the throne at the age of 95 and still nobly carrying out hundreds of engagements each year and with three heirs in the direct line of succession.

This year in April the 275th anniversary of the Battle of Culloden (fought on 16th

April 1746 on Drummossie moor overlooking Inverness) was marked online for a second time by the National Trust together with the Gaelic Society. There has been a gathering annually on Culloden Moor since 1924 to commemorate the fallen. This most poignant of battles (that was over in just under an hour) was the decisive end to the Jacobite cause and changed the face of Scotland dramatically. The brave Highlanders who gave their lives in support of Bonnie Prince Charlie's quest for the Scottish throne were outnumbered and outgunned. Culloden Moor is now probably the most important battlefield site in Britain. It is effectively a mass grave with the fallen of many clans remembered with a stone memorial. We know Kincaid's were present at Culloden although not how many. Of course the Outlander series is fiction but I am sure we all enjoyed the fact that of the 30 men who accompanied Jamie Fraser to the battle of Culloden, was called Kincaid! As the saying goes "There is no smoke without fire"! Almost 300 years after the battle, Murray Pittock, Professor of English Literature at the University of Glasgow writes this:

"The irony is that a federal British Isles under a single crown, <u>which had existed</u> between 1603 and 1707 and is effectively what the Jacobites wanted, is closer to where we are today than the victors of Culloden could ever have imagined."

Over the winter I, together with the superb help of a small team of Kincaids, have been working on an interactive Clan Kincaid Map which will hopefully be a great addition to our website when it is finished. Anyone travelling to Scotland will, should they wish, be able to use it to help plan their Kincaid history touring. I hope to take a family trip this summer holidays to try out the route. We have all enjoyed reading a little more into some of the branches of the clan and working out what I hope will be a 'Top Ten' places to visit in and around Edinburgh with Clan Kincaid significance.

Whilst giving time to reading a little more widely as the project unfolds, I have come across some extraordinary claims which I either know to be untrue or have no idea where they came from which I thought I would share below. This has certainly allowed for some light heartedness to come into the proceedings. I think in today's parlance it would be "fake news"!

These two gems came from Kyncade Tower (Notes from Campsie Parish):

"This shows the Lennoxes, or LeLevenax to have been of the Norman invasion, of about 1400, and of recent advent in Scotland, compared to the Kincaids who date at least prior to 503" "It was Miss Margaret Lennox who had the bones of all the Kincaids who had fallen in battle from Bannockburn on, gathered and placed in the Lennox Vault in the Clachan Kirkyard and the vault sealed..."

Now that would have been quite a feat.

What fun! We learn as we live trying to run with what is true or right and shake out the dross. Living now day by day we are creating the history people will read of in years to come. As they do so may the name of Kincaid be always associated with honour, valour, kindness and an ability to stand for all that is good in this world.

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A Message from the President

I am sure we are all ready to get back to normal following over a year of restrictions concerning Covid 19. It is my hope that many Highland Games will resume in 2021.

There was an article in Issue 103, March 2021 of the "Defender" concerning the Kincaid Scholarship in the Scottish Arts. I want to take this opportunity to honor and pay tribute to William (Bill) H. Kincaid and to explain how the Scholarship became a reality. Bill is a founding member (L-003) of Clan Kincaid. He joined the St. Andrews Society of Detroit (SASD) in December of 1985 and is a current member. He chaired the Highland Games at Historic Fort Wayne in 1988. He served as SASD Treasurer and as its President in 1991-1992.

With his own family and friends he started a Scholarship Fund at St. Andrews Society of Detroit to encourage young people to get involved and participate in Highland Games through the Scottish Arts of bagpiping, dance, and drumming. He ran the Scholarship program for many years. In 2003 the Scholarship program was renamed to honor William Kincaid and his meaningful contribution to the SASD. The Scholarship is funded 100% by raffle tickets sold each year during the Highland Games sponsored by SASD. Raffle tickets sold in 2020 generated \$8,900 for the Scottish Arts Program.

The St. Andrews Society is very proud of its Kincaid Scholarship program and the number of Scholarship grants that are provided each year.

We at Clan Kincaid Association International are very proud of William H. Kincaid for his contributions to both organizations.







Why Genealogy?

Many readers of "The Defender" are amateur genealogists and perhaps even a few are professionals. We all identify with the Kincaid Family in one way or another. Some are relatively new to this endeavour of finding ancestors while others are continuing and/or preserving the work of others in the family. So this begs the question, WHY?

Those who make a hobby of collection things have a goal of reducing the number of things yet to collect. If one collects stamps and finds one more to add to their collection then there is one less to find. Bird watchers can check off another species when they make a visual confirmation leaving a shorter list. Even travelers can take satisfaction that they have one less country to visit as they explore a new destination. Yet genealogists continually create new problems for themselves for when they discover a new ancestor it creates two new problems – who were their parents (or four new problems – who were their grandparents? And so forth). There can be no final goal only the frustration as leads disappear in the mists of unrecorded history. We are still left with the question – Why Bother?

Other than our siblings, no one else shares our exact ancestry. Venturing even one generation in either direction (up or down/ earlier or later) removes half the interest in our family heritage unless we are researching lines whose DNA is not within us. Genealogists are often puzzled why others in their family take little or no interest in their research. They ponder what will become of all their efforts when they are gone. So why do we do it?

Could it be that there is a profit motive behind all the work? Not likely, for there has not been a family history book, collection of charts, photo album or repository of files on the "Best Sellers" list. In fact, genealogy can be an expensive pursuit with little return (if any) in a monetary form. So why is genealogy one of the most popular forms of activity today?

The answer can be complex. There are those who feel an obligation to provide their family with a heritage. The inspiration for this obligation might come from a family member, it might be prompted by the media (Think the "Roots" series of the 1970s). It might be instilled in us by our cultural roots. The "Bible" is based in genealogy. Ancestor worship is common in many cultures.

There is the challenge of pure research – getting at the truth. We live in an era when there can be many truths and we are constantly questioning what is really true. Genealogists revel in discovering documents that can identify ancestors. Sometimes it is as simple as a census record, a church record, a military record, a gravestone, etc. Sometimes it is a combination of events, geographic locations or even a "preponderance of evidence".

Then there are those who have a love of history. They place ancestors in the larger picture of historical events. Grandfather was at "D-Day". Great Great Grandmother sailed around Cape Horn. Great Great Grandfather was at the coronation of Queen Victoria. Interest in historical events is greatly heightened when one has a personal connection. One is reminded of the statement that -"Those who ignore history are condemned to repeat it". Genealogy expands one's knowledge of history and also geography as one becomes acquainted with places unknown.

There can always be a role of being the go to person in the family when someone wants to know about family connections. Genealogists are often the instigators of family reunions, clan gatherings, festival displays, etc. where family can gather to renew or establish connections. Genealogists enjoy the unique role of knowing what others in the family want to know but may not be willing to make the effort to learn.

Whatever the motivation, all of us owe a debt of gratitude to the genealogists who provide the "Ties that Bind" family together and help to give each of us that unique identity that we so enjoy. Learn more about your family and share that knowledge with future generations. They will come to appreciate that knowledge someday.
