President's Message

Dear Clan Kincaid Association International members,

As this year comes to a close I look back in retrospect. Having served as President of Clan Kincaid Association International for nine years I am ready to turn leadership as President over to Hugh Kincaid.

The results of the election from our Returning Officer are included in this edition of "The Defender". I have enjoyed my tenure as President and feel that, with the help of an outstanding leadership team, we have accomplished a great deal. When I took over in 2014 we did not have a savings account and only a balance of \$5,968 in our checking account. Today we have \$18,350 in checking and \$6,279 in savings for a total of \$24,629. Clan Kincaid Association International has been registered as an Organization with the State of Kentucky for many years. In 2015 we were able to apply for 501 (c) (3) status and I received notification on August 13, 2015 that our application was approved and Clan Kincaid is now a nonprofit organization registered with the U.S. Federal Government. Topher Kincaid, our Treasurer, has all the necessary information to file our annual reports for both the State of Kentucky and the Department of Internal Revenue Service.

My thanks and appreciation to our remarkable Board of Officers for volunteering and giving of their time and talent so Clan Kincaid operates as a coordinated team. In reviewing my tenure from 2014 through 2022, we recall the enjoyment of our Gatherings both in the U.S. and Scotland and arranged by James Brisbin and his travel contacts in Scotland. In August 2014 we traveled to Scotland for a tour of our Homeland and attended the Royal Military Tattoo at Edinburgh Castle. In September 2016 we traveled to Estes Park Colorado for their 40th Highland Games where our Clan Chief, Madam Arabella was Honored Guest and led the Parade of Clans. In 2017 once again we returned to Scotland and the Royal Military Tattoo on the Royal Mile and Edinburgh Castle, where our beloved Clan Chief, Madam Arabella, was one of a select group of Clan Chiefs honored on the Castle's Esplanade. (See "The Defender" Issue #90, September 2017.) In July 2019 we attended one of the largest Highland Games in North America at Grandfather Mountain, Linville, NC. James Brisbin and Hugh Kincaid coordinated Clan Kincaid attendance at this superb Gathering. Madam Arabella attended with her two sons, Angus and Dominic. Madam Arabella was Honored Guest and opened the Games, led the Parade of Clans and also later closed the Games.

So many fond memories were made sharing our heritage and kinship over the years.

We look forward to possible future events celebrating our Scottish heritage with our fellow Clan Kincaid members. I send my best wishes for continued success and I will be available to help in any way. Thank you for the opportunity to serve.





Christmas Pudding Balls Recipe

This receipt was tucked away in one of Madam Heather's books having been cut out of a newspaper at some point. I have taped it back together and am planning to try using it this year if I have some leftover pudding! Having live through the war, she, like so many of her generation, never wasted a thing!

Christmas Pudding Balls:

Re-steam Christmas pudding until it is malleable. Shape the mixture into little 2 to 2 and half oz balls. Dip these into raw beaten strained egg and then in ground almonds. Count the number you have made and refrigerate until needed. Then assemble a matching number of diamond shapes in softened Angelica and halved red lace cherries.

Just before serving, heat oil in your deep fryer. When it reaches the temperature at which a scrap of raw potato seethes furiously when dipped in put in the prepared Christmas pudding balls. Allow them to fry to a nice golden brown.

Arrange them on a serving dish. Stab one diamond of Angelica into the top of each, press cut side of cherry down beside each diamond, dust icing sugar over all to simulate snow.

A Scottish Christmas Story - Hugh Kincaid (L-174)


Several years ago I asked some friends I worked at Disney with to help me with a project. We made an audio recording of the Nativity story performed in Scottish dialect. It is based on a book I found on a visit to Scotland called *The Glasgow Gospel* by Jamie Stuart.

Mr. Stuart became internationally famous when, at the age of 71, he became a bestselling author with The *Glasgow Gospel* – which tells the stories of the Gospel in the everyday language of Glaswegians. He continued to have a remarkable writing career until his death at the age of 95.

Paul Mungall, the narrator of the story was a natural choice for the project. An old Disney compatriot of mine, he was born and raised in Glasgow. Throughout the years he has tried to teach me the nuances of the Glaswegian dialect. Unfortunately, my hillbilly upbringing would never submit to his efforts.

The recording has been passed around via email, at Christmas time, for a couple of decades and has been heard in all around the world from Jacksonville to Japan and Augusta to Australia.

In 2009 I traveled to Scotland to join my cousin Sherrye Dix and meet other members of the Kincaid Clan. The ancient Celtic spirit beckoned me to my Scottish roots. I was enriched by the history of visits to St. Giles Cathedral, Melrose Abbey, Jedburgh Abbey, Oban, Kilchurn Castle, William Wallace Statue, Rosslyn Chapel, Glencoe, Loch Ness, Stirling, Mugdock Castle, Edinburgh, Lennox Castle, and the Kincaid lands. I couldn't get enough of my family history. I was enveloped with the Kincaid Clan. I wanted to know more. I was encouraged to take a DNA test at the gathering of Clans in Edinburgh for the Kincaid Clan. I took the test with great anticipation. The test was with Family Tree DNA. I waited weeks in excitement for the results. Yes, it was confirmed I am a Kincaid by blood. All my grandparents had passed away by the time I was in second grade, so I was fascinated with who I was and where I came from. My grandmother was Margaret Mary Kincaid (also known as Maggie), and my great-grandfather was John Francis Kincaid was born in 1856 in Washington, Missouri. The journey began as I was determined to know more about history. My next lead was John Laurent Kincaid, born in 1824 in Missouri. I could see a trend going on with the name "John." I felt at a dead end as I asked myself, "is there not another name for a Kincaid other than John?" How is my connection to Scotland going to come about? Thank goodness I read an article in the *Defender* from someone in Maine. I swiftly wrote to this lovely lady and began a correspondence. Soon to my amazement, I found out we were related. Finally, I felt my journey could continue to find my roots in Scotland.

To no surprise, my next relative was.. wait for it.. yes, it was another John. John D. Kincaid was born in 1791 in Lincoln, Maine. Yes, one more, John Kincaid, was born in 1762 in Wiscasset, Maine. Samuel Kincaid was born in 1724 in Oyster River, New Hampshire. My next question was, why did the family move from Oyster River, New Hampshire, to Maine? I wrote back to my cousin in Maine with this question. The Indians had killed off some of the Kincaid family, and the survivors moved to Maine. Next was Naphtali Kincaid, born in 1695 in Oyster River, New Hampshire. My next question was, will I ever be able to find out when my ancestors came from Scotland? I made inquiries on Ancestory.com. I soon took another DNA test from Ancestory.com. I hit the mother lode and got answers.

My DNA was the same as Family Tree (no surprise), but Ancestry.com gave me more personal information and family connections. I found David Kincaid, born in 1664 in Stirlingshire, Scotland. I continue to get updated information from Ancestory.com daily. When I was growing up, my Mom maintained I was Irish, Scottish, and French. My Dad claimed I was Polish. To my delight, I found out I'm a European mutt. I have ancestors from Scotland, Ireland, England, Poland, Germany, France, Netherlands, Norway, Denmark, and Sweden.

As some of you know, I met my husband, Roger Allen Kincaid, at Grand Father Mountain. Before we married, I bought him a DNA test from Ancestry.com as a Christmas present. His results returned, and I began his family tree search for his ancestors. Yes, we are cousins, but our common ancestor was 400 years ago.

If you find a royal line in your family, you will be able to get further back in time on your family tree. Don't be discouraged by this statement, as I learned you may have Royal Blood Lines and may not know it. Your DNA is the magic in this case. I strongly recommend getting a DNA test. No matter your DNA process, it will be a journey of excitement and anticipation. Who knows, maybe I'm your cousin?

Scottish Shortbread Recipe - Emily Silversparre (F--003)

A simple Christmas classic and all around delicious treat. Shortbread really is only 3 ingredients in the purest form (though I add vanilla sometimes to add another layer of flavor). It's a long standing family favorite and one of my favorites of all time.

- 1 cup (240 ml) all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup (120 ml) of butter (salted, room temp)
- 1/3 cup (80 ml) powdered or confectioners sugar
- Splash of vanilla (extra optional touch)

Preheat your oven to 325* F. Then mix your ingredients together until the dough is clumped together and there is no loose flour. Once blended, pat your dough into a large disk shape on a greased pan, or you can roll it out and cut into shapes of your choosing and transfer the cutouts to a greased pan. If you go for the disk, make sure to make cuts into the disk to help with separating the cookies once baked, like cutting a pizza pie. Bake your shortbread for 25-30 mins until barely golden at the edges. Cut outs may need less time!

Remove from the pan and allow to cool, then enjoy!

The Sale of Lennox Castle - (Submitted by James Brisbin – L-91)

While cleaning my desk, a seemingly endless task, I came across a letter written by my mother (Olivia P. Brisbin 1908-2004) in August of 1958. It was addressed to my brother (John David Kincaid Brisbin 1937-2019) who was travelling in France at the time and to my father and me while we were traveling in Scotland.

The letter is two pages in length, single spaced, typed. It is full of news mostly of a personal nature but one paragraph stands out as having particular importance to Kincaid history of which my mother dedicated many years of research. This paragraph deals with the sale of Lennox Castle by the Kincaid Family in March of 1927. Here is an exact transcript of the paragraph in question.

> It is so nice to know that the Kincaid name is still respected and has some prominence in Scotland today. Glad you will have my letter re: Kincaid House before going to Campsie. Mr. Moir is a remarkable man – positively psychic. Kincaid-Lennox Castle was sold 24 & 25 March 1927, at auction. The estate contained 8,650 acres, Lennox Arms Hotel, Kincaid Print Works, Inchbelly Sand Pits near Kirkintilloch, 9 Dairy, Stock and sheep raising farms, 7 small residences, several excellent shootings, well-secured feus (and this is spelled correctly) and leasehold rents, producing L-700 per annum, etc. (From newspaper clipping in Grace Kincaid scrapbook).

With the advent of the internet, email, zoom meetings and inexpensive telephone service, the art of letter writing seems to be disappearing. I have reams of letters written by my parents as they pursued their research. I am constantly discovering new tidbits to add to the family history. It is hoped that many of our family will continue to preserve their family legacy for future generations.


